A Farewell Letter from Chris Geronimos

After forty years in the IUPAT, twenty-seven years on staff, and five of those years as the Business Manager/Secretary Treasurer of District Council 57, I am retiring. And much like my predecessor did, I believe I am leaving it better than I found it. As I hand over leadership to Brian Herbinko, I know that DC 57 will continue to improve on a legacy of excellence that our union has built over the past twenty-five years.

When our International formed District Council 57 in 1999, they had an eye towards the future of the construction industry and the labor movement. In many ways, our communities were in flux as they are now, and we need to make sure now as then that we stick together for our brothers and sisters. Rocky DeStefano, our first and longest-tenured BM/ST, established and grew a strong culture centered on community, fervent trade unionism, and growth through organizing. Rocky always had the members' best interests at heart, and that driving force propelled DC 57 forward during his tenure. As I succeeded Rocky in 2019, I don't think anyone, least of all myself, knew what was in store for our union and the world. The coronavirus pandemic upended everything, but it also proved to our communities something we already knew: our painters, drywall finishers, glaziers, and other craft workers from Erie to Pittsburgh to State College and everywhere in between are essential workers. Without us, Southwestern Pennsylvania cannot thrive.

We're still seeing some lasting effects from COVID, but our craftspeople are more important than ever. The pandemic exposed just how beholden we are on foreign manufacturing, but federal legislation is bringing new plants and production back to our communities, and our DC 57 members are helping build those facilities. The Biden administration's historic investment in infrastructure and manufacturing means we will see dozens of roads and bridges rebuilt, repainted, and repaired in Allegheny County alone over the next few years, not to mention all the infrastructure investments in the thirty-one other counties we represent.

At the end of the day, whether you're a Democrat, Republican, or independent, our members work more hours with more money going to our pension because of our current federal administration's attention to critical infrastructure projects. But it's not just federal leadership that matters. Our own union leadership is just as important. Whether you're a service representative, staff member, or a leader on the jobsite or in the classroom, you must do your part to protect the future of your union. We must follow in the footsteps of those that came before us, leaning on their experience and expertise as we seek to grow market share.

If you'll indulge me for a moment, I want to pass on a few lessons I learned in my time on staff that might help the next and future leadership teams. First, strive to keep your health and welfare well funded. Union leadership and trustees are always looking to make healthcare coverage more affordable, but in the meantime we have to keep our plans solvent. One of the advantages we have over the non-union sector is the ability to provide our members and their families with good healthcare coverage, and regularly allocating money to our fund allows us to maintain that advantage. Second, think about the future of our union hall and training facility. Every member knows how cramped our FTI buildings are, and purchasing or building a new training facility will allow us to take another major step in our District Council's evolution. Our building serves multiple purposes: the main one is to train your future brothers and sisters, but it also showcases our crafts for our union and non-union contractors. It's your house, and you want to impress the people that come to visit. Prospective contractors won't want to sign if they come to a broken house. We established a building fund to meet this goal and we must build up that fund so we can establish a facility that suits our growing District Council.

As our members up north know, having a local training space instead of having to travel hours away for training is a massive improvement, and we are still looking to find a space for our central PA brothers and sisters. In all my years as a member and on staff, the most successful unions I've encountered have always had great funding from the membership. The ones that succeed best for their members are the ones funded by their members. Successful unions are financially healthy due to great funding, whether that's healthcare, annuity, and retirement funds or money spent on improving buildings, supporting pro-labor politicians, and improving market share.

Third, I want to note that how we speak about our union sets a tone. When you talk to other trades and they speak positively about their union and you speak negatively about your union, how does that make everyone feel? Who will join and support you if you trash your union? No union is perfect, and I've certainly made my share of mistakes during my time here, as has everyone. But we must discuss and solve our issues in-house. We fight too many battles against other unions, the non-union, and anti-union politicians to also fight among ourselves. Help your brothers and sisters, find the next members of DC 57, and make sure everyone knows the IUPAT is a place where careers are built and families are uplifted.

Finally, I want to highlight the District Council staff that will carry on the work after I retire. Brian Herbinko, our next Business Manager, is superbly qualified to become the third Business Manager in DC 57's history. He's been a Local 6 member for twenty-three years and on staff for nearly a decade. I know Brian well, and having him shadow me for the past few months has only increased my appreciation for him. Many of you have crossed paths with him already in the training department, but for anyone who might not know Brian, he is a consummate unionist and someone who knows how to get things done. DC 57 is in good hands with him leading the charge. Brian is leaving the training department, but he has put together a team of instructors that do a great job providing western PA with the safest and best-trained finishing tradespeople. Our servicing department, directed by Steve Olash and filled with incredibly dedicated service reps, have navigated COVID and its fallout, helping secure needed protections and record contracts across all our locals.

Joe Hughes and the political department make sure that labor has a voice when politicians decide whether to help corporations or the working class. And while Claire Cawley may be our newest director, the organizing department is making progress signing more contractors across crafts. Last but certainly not least, our office staff: Deena, Jess, and MJ often work behind the scenes, but are invaluable to DC 57's operation. Without their skills the District Council would not exist. I can hardly take credit for having a staff that works so closely together, but I am nonetheless proud that we have such a hardworking, dedicated team. I look forward to seeing everyone do great things.

A secure retirement is one of, if not the, single most important thing for which a union fights. I am grateful to have reached that point, but I didn't do it alone. People helped me every step of the way, and you all are still helping me by paying my pension. But every one of you will reach this point someday, whether you're a first year apprentice or someone with tens of thousands of hours worked. You will need someone to pay your pensions, and I hope that everyone does their best to find and help the person that will ultimately replace them. I ask you as somebody who's stepping away from the organization, but with a heart still here: Ponder these things and hopefully some will ring true for you. Thank you for forty wonderful years with the best union anyone can ask for.

Department Updates

I think it's fair to say we all wish we could ignore what's happening as we approach the general election this November. But as union members and working people, we can't dissociate from this fight. I don't want to raise anybody's blood pressure by rehashing each presidential candidate's shortcomings and the unprecedented chaos of this presidential cycle—we are bombarded by this topic daily. Instead, I want to remind everyone of the Biden administration's ethos —its character and moral nature. During this administration's time in office, we largely regained the normalcy of our pre-pandemic lives. We've experienced a red-hot labor market with employers competing for qualified workers, often by providing higher pay and other attractive workplace benefits. And most importantly, we've seen the enactment of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law bringing historic investments to our communities—investments that are translating into work opportunities for IUPAT members. Biden appointed people that are incredibly pro-worker to key positions like the Secretary of Labor and the National Labor Relations Board.

But we're living in a time that holds major favorability for forming unions, and a lot of that is due to the ethos on display by this presidential administration. DC 57 wants to help every non-union worker we encounter join or form a union, and we strive to accomplish this every single day. Our challenge of Organizing will only be more difficult if we fail to elect the person who will carry on President Biden's pro-worker agenda: Kamala Harris. I know I've left out a lot of the details that make this such a contentious race in many peoples' minds, especially after all of July's events. If you'd like to discuss these intricacies, I'm more than happy to do that with you. Let's remember that we are a union of working-class people with a collective mission to better our working conditions and lead dignified lives both in and out of the workplace. 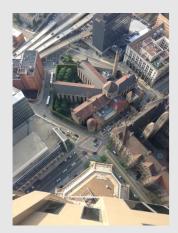

So I have to adjust my teaching style for all age groups and every student's learning ability." He's looking forward to expanding his own knowledge of the other crafts we represent and take what Brian built, and with the help of the rest of the instructors improve the training opportunities at FTI of Western PA. When asked which qualities he values most in apprentices and students, he cited a willingness to learn, being on time, showing up every day with a good attitude, doing what is required of them, asking questions, participating in class, and being teachable. He can teach apprentices the skills they'll need on the jobsite, but those unteachable qualities are what set the best tradespeople apart from the rest.

When he's not in the training department, Thad likes to spend time with his family, travel (especially on bowhunting trips), reading, going to his camp, riding motorcycles, and listening to live music. Whether you've known Thad for years or will get to know him in the coming weeks, make sure to introduce yourself. He will have a big role in training the next generation of DC 57 members, but members in the field have an equally important job in creating the best tradespeople western PA can offer.

More Infrastructure Money On Its Way to PA

On April 2nd, IUPAT DC 57 hosted a press conference at the Carnegie hall and training center to announce Pennsylvania DEP's \$475 million RISE PA Community Pollution Reduction Grant (CPRG) application to the EPA. The grant proposal seeks to decarbonize Pennsylvania's heavy industry, one of the traditionally harder industries in which to reduce carbon emissions. Because the Shapiro administration took care to involve labor from the early stages of the grant process, there will be fair labor bonuses, prevailing wage, and apprenticeship standards attached to all projects under this grant should the Commonwealth receive the money from the EPA. As the speakers, including DC 57's own Brian Herbinko, noted, this proposal is a common sense approach that helps business, the environment, and labor. While labor and environmental groups don't always see eye to eye, this proposal, which would put our members to work on energy efficiency measures without restricting current energy production facilities, gives us an unprecedented opportunity to work together to make our communities cleaner and more equitable. The Environmental Protection Agency agreed, and on July 22nd announced that the RISE PA grant was awarded to the PA DEP. We look forward to this money being used to put union members on jobs that benefit our community.

As the chair of DC 57's Black CORE Committee, I attended this year's CBTU conference alongside 70 of my brothers and sisters from District Councils around the country. GP Williams addressed our group, as did GVP Mike Gutierrez, speaking about the fight for equality and inclusion in our union and the need to recruit members from all backgrounds and walks of life. Construction trades unions have not historically been the friendliest to Black workers, but it's encouraging to see the IUPAT and other building trades focus on bringing in workers from communities we may have overlooked in the past. All of our crafts are extremely busy and our jobs are more stressful than ever, so it's important that we create spaces for everyone to join a career in the trades and thrive in that career. I'm proud to be a Black trade unionist, and I'm proud to be part of a union that takes the time to make sure you're welcomed into the career, regardless of your race or background.
